Business and Anticipated Business Plan

6. Describe in detail the business of the issuer and the anticipated business plan of the issuer.

BBQ in the Park PTY LTD is an Australian company that manufactures and distributes electric park barbeques. In 2019 we formed a California corporation, BBQ in the Park, Inc., with the objective to be the first company to take this product to the North American market. This offering statement presents our plans to raise money for our California corporation. We plan to utilize the know-how we developed in Australia, and bring it to North America. BBQ in the Park, Inc. currently has 1 employe

and several contract arrangements in place with external suppliers and professionals.

North Americans love parks and enjoy time in the parks; however, parks in North America provide wood-burning cookstoves and fire pits for barbecues. The problem is that with an increase in environmental concerns, an increase in the number and ferocity of wildfires, and an increase in health concerns from smoke; fewer places are allowing fires in parks. In some places, the infrastructure has been removed completely and with fewer people using parks, the social and economic value of the community suffers. The electric barbecue addresses these environmental, operating, and community concerns.

There are two main groups that could benefit from this venture. One being park managers and operators as they might have a piece of park infrastructure that is popular and draws in park visitors, while at the same time being environmentally friendly, cost-effective, easy and safe to maintain. The other main group to benefit are park users. They could have a piece of park infrastructure that is environmentally friendly, safe, hygienic, easy to use, and convenient. Together, this leads to viable, healthy, connected, and safe communities, which both groups could benefit from.

The total available market for this product is massive compared to the Australian market. Australia has about 547 government entities, a population of approximately 24 million people and there are about 40,000 electric park barbecues throughout the country. This works out to about 73 barbecues per entity. In North America, there are about 92,912 government entities, with a population of approximately 364 million people. Using the same sales breakdown as in Australia (about 73 barbecues/government entity), this means about 6,782,576 barbecues in this total available market.

On top of this main target, there are also campgrounds, of which there are over 20,000 known. And thirdly, there is the development market; apartment and community developments with rooftop patios and community gathering areas for promoted well-being, connected, and safe communities.

If we sold directly ourselves, it would take years to develop a network of contacts, to build relationships, grow a brand name, and build a strong reputation. Using local distributors as our channel to the market, we aim to leverage the distributor's network, contacts, relationships, and reputation. This could position us in being able to strongly promote the product, make sales, and as one of the first businesses with this product in North America, corner the market for growth and sustainability. While the government market is large, it is quite closed and word of mouth and relationships are still the best forms of advertising. A local distributor with these relationships we assume is the fastest and best channel for this market.

This distributor model is a good fit for various reasons. One, the distributor already sells other park infrastructure (playground equipment, shelters, picnic tables, benches, etc.) so adding another piece of infrastructure such as the electric park barbecue makes sense. Two, the distributor usually has a network of contacts in the specific geographic area so they are well-positioned to promote and sell the product to people/government entities they know and have a trusting relationship with. Three, they know the market. They know which municipalities may be building new parks or renovating parks and therefore, could have funds and be in the market for such a barbecue. Four, there is a good profit margin available with this product so there should be a financial incentive to grow and scale-up this product for all involved.

We propose to commercialize the barbecue by ensuring it meets all safety guidelines and regulations. While this is not always mandatory, it is important to governments for insurance and piece-of-mind reasons. Having local distributors in place so sales can be completed by known and trusted people who know the park industry and market could also be positive. We are commercializing by having completed our homework through surveys and attendance at conferences and exhibitions to confirm an affordable price point while obtaining a viable profit margin for those in the supply chain. We aim to grow by providing a proven product based on our Australian experience, which aims to ensure our popularity, reputation, and potential to scale up the business across geographical areas.

BBQ in the Park currently has 1 employees.

Risk Factors

1. If the Company is unable to raise additional capital on acceptable terms, it may be unable to maintain sufficient growth or commercialize its products. The Company may require substantial future capital in order to continue to conduct the research, product development, and marketing required to scale the business. There can be no assurance that additional funding will be available on acceptable terms. Failure to satisfy our capital requirements may adversely affect the Company's business, financial condition, and results of operations because the Company would be left without the capital required to complete product development or establish sales and marketing capabilities.
2. Major health epidemics, such as the outbreak caused by a coronavirus (COVID-19), and other outbreaks or unforeseen or catastrophic events could disrupt and adversely affect our operations, financial condition and business.

The United States and other countries have experienced, and may experience in the future, major health epidemics related to viruses, other pathogens, and other unforeseen or catastrophic events, including natural disasters, extreme weather events, power loss, acts of war, and terrorist attacks. For example, there was an outbreak of COVID-19, a novel virus, which has spread to the United States and other countries and declared a global pandemic. The global spread of COVID-19 has created significant volatility and uncertainty in financial markets. Although COVID-19 is currently not material to our results of operations, there is significant uncertainty relating to the potential impact of COVID-19 on our business. The extent to which COVID-19 impacts our current capital raise and our ability to obtain future financing, as well as our results of operations and financial condition, generally, will depend on future developments which are highly uncertain and cannot be predicted, including new information which may emerge concerning the severity of COVID-19 and the actions taken by governments and private businesses to contain COVID-19 or treat its impact, among others. If the disruptions posed by COVID-19 continue for an extensive period of time, our business, results of operations, and financial condition may be materially adversely affected.

3. Any valuation at this stage is difficult to assess.

Unlike listed companies that are valued publicly through market-driven stock prices, the valuation of private companies, especially startups, is difficult to assess and you may risk overpaying for your investment. In addition, there may be additional classes of equity with rights that are superior to the class of equity being sold.

4. We are highly dependent on the Services of our Founders.

Our future business and results of operations depend in significant part upon the continued contributions of our Co-founders. If we lose those services or if they fail to perform in their current position, or if we are not able to attract and retain skilled employees in addition to our CEO and the current team, this could adversely affect the development of our business plan and harm our business. In addition, the loss of any other member of the board of directors or executive officers could harm the Company's business, financial condition, cash flow and results of operations.

5. Investment in personnel.

An early-stage investment is also an investment in the entrepreneur or management of the company. Being able to execute on the business plan is often an important factor in whether the business is viable and successful. You should be aware that a portion of your investment may fund the compensation of the company's employees, including its management. You should carefully review any disclosure regarding the company's use of proceeds.

6. Start-up investing is risky.

Investing in early-stage companies is very risky, highly speculative, and should not be made by anyone who cannot afford to lose their entire investment. Unlike an investment in a mature business where there is a track record of revenue and income, the success of a startup or early-stage venture often relies on the development of a new product or service that may or may not find a market. While the company must disclose certain information, since the company is at an early-stage they may only be able to provide limited information about its business plan and operations because it does not have fully developed operations or a long history. 8. Our future growth depends on our ability to develop and retain customers.

Our future growth depends to a large extent on our ability to effectively anticipate and adapt to customer requirements and offer services that meet customer demands. If we are unable to attract customers and/or retain customers, our business, results of operations and financial condition may be materially adversely affected.

9. Any forecasts we make about our operations may prove to be inaccurate.

We must, among other things, determine appropriate risks, rewards, and level of investment in our product lines, respond to economic and market variables outside of our control, respond to competitive developments and continue to attract, retain, and motivate qualified employees. There can be no assurance that we will be successful in meeting these challenges and addressing such risks and the failure to do so could have a materially adverse effect on our business, results of operations, and financial condition. Our prospects must be considered in light of the risks, expenses, and difficulties frequently encountered by companies in the early stage of development. As a result of these risks, challenges, and uncertainties, the value of your investment could be significantly reduced or completely lost.

10. *The U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission does not pass upon the merits of any securities offered or the terms of the offering, nor does it pass upon the accuracy or completeness of any offering document or literature.*

endorsement or guarantee of compliance as it relates to this Offering.

11. *Neither the Offering nor the Securities have been registered under federal or state securities laws, leading to an absence of certain regulation applicable to the Company.*

The securities being offered have not been registered under the Securities Act of 1933 (the "Securities Act"), in reliance on exemptive provisions of the Securities Act. Similar reliance has been placed on apparently available exemptions from securities registration or qualification requirements under applicable state securities laws. No assurance can be given that any offering currently qualifies or will continue to qualify under one or more of such exemptive provisions due to, among other things, the adequacy of disclosure and the manner of distribution, the existence of similar offerings in the past or in the future, or a change of any securities law or regulation that has retroactive effect. If, and to the extent that, claims or suits for rescission are brought and successfully concluded for failure to register any offering or other offerings or for acts or omissions constituting offenses under the Securities Act, the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, or applicable state securities laws, the Company could be materially adversely affected, jeopardizing the Company's ability to operate successfully. Furthermore, the human and capital resources of the Company could be adversely affected by the need to defend actions under these laws, even if the Company is ultimately successful in its defense.

12. *The Company has the right to extend the Offering Deadline, conduct multiple closings, or end the Offering early.*

The Company may extend the Offering Deadline beyond what is currently stated herein. This means that your investment may continue to be held in escrow while the Company attempts to raise the Minimum Amount even after the Offering Deadline stated herein is reached. While you have the right to cancel your investment up to 48 hours before an Offering Deadline, if you choose to not cancel your investment, your investment will not be accruing interest during this time and will simply be held until such time as the new Offering Deadline is reached without the Company receiving the Minimum Amount, at which time it will be returned to you without interest or deduction, or the Company receives the Minimum Amount, at which time it will be released to the Company to be used as set forth herein. Upon or shortly after release of such funds to the Company, the Securities will be issued and distributed to you. If the Company reaches the target offering amount prior to the Offering Deadline, they may conduct the first of multiple closings of the Offering prior to the Offering Deadline, provided that the Company gives notice to the investors of the closing at least five business days prior to the closing (absent a material change that would require an extension of the Offering and reconfirmation of the investment commitment). Thereafter, the Company may conduct additional closings until the Offering Deadline. The Company may also end the Offering early; if the Offering reaches its target offering amount after 21-calendar days but before the deadline, the Company can end the Offering with 5 business days' notice. This means your failure to participate in the Offering in a timely manner, may prevent you from being able to participate – it also means the Company may limit the amount of capital it can raise during the Offering by ending it early.

13. *The Company's management may have broad discretion in how the Company uses the net proceeds of the Offering.*

Despite that the Company has agreed to a specific use of the proceeds from the Offering, the Company's management will have considerable discretion over the allocation of proceeds from the Offering. You may not have the opportunity, as part of your investment decision, to assess whether the proceeds are being used appropriately.

14. *The Securities issued by the Company will not be freely tradable until one year from the initial purchase date. Although the Securities may be tradable under federal securities law, state securities regulations may apply, and each Investor should consult with his or her attorney.*

You should be aware of the long-term nature of this investment. There is not now and likely will not be a public market for the Securities. Because the Securities offered in this Offering have not been registered under the Securities Act or under the securities laws of any state or non-United

States jurisdiction, the Securities have transfer restrictions and cannot be resold in the United States except pursuant to Rule 501 of Regulation CF. It is not currently contemplated that registration under the Securities Act or other securities laws will be affected. Limitations on the transfer of the shares of Securities may also adversely affect the price that you might be able to obtain for the shares of Securities in a private sale. Investors should be aware of the long-term nature of their investment in the Company. Investors in this Offering will be required to represent that they are purchasing the Securities for their own account, for investment purposes and not with a view to resale or distribution thereof.

15. *Investors will not be entitled to any inspection or information rights other than those required by Regulation CF.*

Investors will not have the right to inspect the books and records of the Company or to receive financial or other information from the Company, other than as required by Regulation CF. Other security holders of the Company may have such rights. Regulation CF requires only the provision of an annual report on Form C and no additional information – there are numerous methods by which the Company can terminate annual report obligations, resulting in no information rights, contractual, statutory or otherwise, owed to Investors. This lack of information could put Investors at a disadvantage in general and with respect to other security holders.

16. *The shares of Securities acquired upon the Offering may be significantly diluted as a consequence of subsequent financings.*

Company equity securities will be subject to dilution. Company intends to issue additional equity to future employees and third-party financing sources in amounts that are uncertain at this time, and as a consequence, holders of Securities will be subject to dilution in an unpredictable amount. Such dilution may reduce the purchaser's economic interests in the Company.

17. The amount of additional financing needed by Company will depend upon several contingencies not foreseen at the time of this Offering. Each such round of financing (whether from the Company or other investors) is typically intended to provide the Company with enough capital to reach the next major corporate milestone. If the funds are not sufficient, Company may have to raise additional capital at a price unfavorable to the existing investors. The availability of capital is at least partially a function of capital market conditions that are beyond the control of the Company. There can be no assurance that the Company will be able to predict accurately the future capital requirements necessary for success or that additional funds will be available from any source. Failure to obtain such financing on favorable terms could dilute or otherwise severely impair the value of the investor's Company securities.

18. *There is no present public market for these Securities and we have arbitrarily set the price.*

The offering price was not established in a competitive market. We have arbitrarily set the price of the Securities with reference to the general status of the securities market and other relevant factors. The Offering price for the Securities should not be considered an indication of the actual value of the Securities and is not based on our net worth or prior earnings. We cannot assure you that the Securities could be resold by you at the Offering price or at any other price.

19. In addition to the risks listed above, businesses are often subject to risks not foreseen or fully appreciated by the management. It is not possible to foresee all risks that may affect us. Moreover, the Company cannot predict whether the Company will successfully effectuate the Company's current business plan. Each prospective Investor is encouraged to carefully analyze the risks and merits of an investment in the Securities and should take into consideration when making such analysis, among other, the Risk Factors discussed above.

The Offering

BBQ IN THE PARK, INC. ("Company") is offering securities under Regulation CF, through Netcapital Funding Portal Inc. ("Portal"). Portal is a FINRA/SEC registered funding portal and will receive cash compensation equal to 4.9% of the value of the securities sold through Regulation CF. Investments made under Regulation CF involve a high degree of risk and those investors who cannot afford to lose their entire investment should not invest.

The Company plans to raise between \$10,000 and \$250,000 through an offering under Regulation CF. Specifically, if we reach the target offering amount of \$10,000, we may conduct the first of multiple or rolling closings of the offering early if we provide notice about the new offering deadline at least five business days prior to such new offering deadline (absent a material change that would require an extension of the offering and reconfirmation of the investment commitment). Oversubscriptions will be allocated on a first come, first served basis. Changes to the offering, material or otherwise, occurring after a closing, will only impact investments which have yet to be closed.

In the event The Company fails to reach the offering target of \$10,000, any investments made under the offering will be cancelled and the investment funds will be returned to the investor.

8. What is the purpose of this offering?

Invested funds received will be put into aspects of the business that directly add value to the business, including:

Growing the distribution network to cover more territory, raising the product's profile and increasing the number of potential customers.

Enhancing the product, supply chain and manufacturing to lower costs and increase efficiency to enhance profitability.

Promoting the product and gaining entry into the urban development landscape to diversify the barbeque's market and increase sales.

10. How will the issuer complete the transaction and deliver securities to the investors?

In entering into an agreement on the Netcapital Funding Portal to purchase securities, both investors and BBQ IN THE PARK, INC. must agree that a transfer agent, which keeps records of our outstanding NetCapital Common Shares (the "Securities"), will issue digital Securities in the investor's name (a paper certificate will not be printed). Similar to other online investment accounts,

the transfer agent will give investors access to a web site to see the number of Securities that they own in our company. These Securities will be issued to investors after the deadline date for investing has passed, as long as the targeted offering amount has been reached. The transfer agent will record the issuance when we have received the purchase proceeds from the escrow agent who is holding your investment commitment.

11. How can an investor cancel an investment commitment?

You may cancel an investment commitment for any reason until 48 hours prior to the deadline identified in the offering by logging in to your account with Netcapital, browsing to the Investments screen, and clicking to cancel your investment commitment. Netcapital will notify investors when the target offering amount has been met. If the issuer reaches the target offering amount prior to the deadline identified in the offering materials, it may close the offering early if it provides notice about the new offering deadline at least five business days prior to such new offering deadline (absent a material change that would require an extension of the offering and reconfirmation of the investment commitment). If an investor does not cancel an investment commitment before the 48-hour period prior to the offering deadline, the funds will be released to the issuer upon closing of the offering and the investor will receive securities in exchange for his or her investment. If an investor does not reconfirm his or her investment commitment after a material change is made to the offering, the investor's investment commitment will be cancelled and the committed funds will be returned.

12. Can the Company perform multiple closings or rolling closings for the offering?

If we reach the target offering amount prior to the offering deadline, we may conduct the first of multiple closings of the offering early, if we provide notice about the new offering deadline at least five business days prior (absent a material change that would require an extension of the offering and reconfirmation of the investment commitment). Thereafter, we may conduct additional closings until the offering deadline. We will issue Securities in connection with each closing. Oversubscriptions will be allocated on a first come, first served basis. Changes to the offering, material or otherwise, occurring after a closing, will only impact investments which have yet to be closed.

Ownership and Capital Structure

The Offering

13. Describe the terms of the securities being offered.

We are issuing Securities at an offering price of \$1.00 per share.

14. Do the securities offered have voting rights?

The Securities are being issued with voting rights. However, so that the crowdfunding community has the opportunity to act together and cast a vote as a group when a voting matter arises, a custodian will cast your vote for you. Please refer to the custodian agreement that you sign before your purchase is complete.

15. Are there any limitations on any voting or other rights identified above?

You are giving your voting rights to the custodian, who will vote the Securities on behalf of all investors who purchased Securities on the Netcapital crowdfunding portal.

16. How may the terms of the securities being offered be modified?

We may choose to modify the terms of the securities before the offering is completed. However, if the terms are modified, and we deem it to be a material change, we need to contact you and you will be given the opportunity to reconfirm your investment. Your reconfirmation must be completed within five business days of receipt of the notice of a material change, and if you do not reconfirm,

your investment will be canceled and your money will be returned to you.

Restrictions on Transfer of the Securities Offered

The securities being offered may not be transferred by any purchaser of such securities during the one-year period beginning when the securities were issued, unless such securities are transferred:

- to the issuer;
- to an accredited investor;
- as part of an offering registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission; or
- to a member of the family of the purchaser or the equivalent, to a trust controlled by the purchaser, to a trust created for the benefit of a member of the family of the purchaser or the equivalent, or in connection with the death or divorce of the purchaser or other similar circumstance.

We plan to keep a tight rein on expenses in order to keep a secure runway for the duration of the time it will take to raise this round.

Video Transcription I'm Canadian by birth but came here to Australia a few years ago. In traveling back and forth that's when we realized these barbecues are everywhere in Australia and have been for a number of years but they're nowhere in North America. The infrastructure is all there in terms of your playground, your shelters, your picnic tables, everything. The only addition is they've got these electric barbecues that are free for use by everyone in the park and they're a push button start. It heats up and then you just do your cooking on it right there and then when you're done it turns itself off automatically so it doesn't run perpetually. You have everything you need; you've got the table right there to eat on, you've got everything for your kids to play on, and after you've cleaned up it's ready for the next person and that happens continually through the day in these parks.

The electric barbecues are everywhere and they're always getting used and they're always really popular, but when you go home it's always these wood burning cookstoves and the fire pits. You might not be able to use it because of the weather or you had to have your own firewood and everything, and it just seemed to be that you didn't get much use of the parks. So I thought, well maybe there's something we can do about that, and we looked at bringing the barbecues to North America that are so popular here in the videos of all time.

So we started the the business BBQ in the Park with the idea of taking these barbecues and introducing them to North America. I think the safety of the barbecues is one of the most important things of it because it's just a push button start, you don't have to worry about turning off the fire; it turns itself off automatically, so there's that aspect of safety so once it's done its turned itself off, cooled off. You can set a timer on it if you don't want it after 9 o'clock at night and until 7 o'clock the next morning so with no open flame there's no chance of catching forest fires. You're going to use it continually during fire band season and there's less chance of something actually happening to the user when you don't have to light up there.

It does attract more people to the park, so more people can barbecue, more people can enjoy that type of activity; it extends then even further to just community in general. You've got the whole connectivity aspect of the community. Cities that have a really good park system and a really good infrastructure are cities that are also more attractive for people to move into. There's the health benefits of bringing people into the park for whatever they're doing in the park, and then the economic benefit as well that's going to finish off everything in that region.

We've got three different models for BBQ in the Park. So you've got the single, which is one hot plate with a bit of counter space around it. Then you've got what we've been calling the single plus; it's still just the one hot plate but it's got a bigger counter. More room for your condiments, more room for what you're cooking, easier to clean and so forth. Then probably one of the most popular is the double. It's bigger yet it's got two hot plates, one at each end, so it can accommodate more than one group which is very important when you've got heavily used parks. Lot's of places you see two doubles back to back, so there's four right there. People can be cooking, while their kids are nearby

on the playground and your friends are at the picnic shelter. Those options are available and I'd say that's probably why the double is the most popular just because of the people you can then get through and have barbecue.
